The "Reasonable Suspicion" Threshold

Most open container laws (like California's Vehicle Code ?23222) prohibit any alcohol-containing vessel with a broken seal in vehicle passenger areas. But here's the kicker: translucent red plastic creates automatic suspicion. A 2023 study by the National Highway Safety Council found 78% of traffic stops involving disposable cups revealed alcoholic beverages.

Material Matters
